	Of the schools that were found to have issues, the discrepancies ranged from minor and easily rectified breaches resulting in minimal concern to those requiring further focus and discussion.
	Some examples of minor breaches that are easily rectified and result in minimum concern include: schools using a type of margarine that does not meet the criteria, full fat rather than semi-skimmed milk being served, or flavoured water products being sold which are not permitted despite being sugar free.
	For more serious breaches such as the menu analysis shows an excess or deficit of the nutrient standards e.g. analysis shows the average lunch over the week contains

too much sodium or too little fibre or carbohydrate; work is continuous with local authorities to rectify any problems.
Education Scotland's Health and Nutrition Inspectors work closely with all 32 local authorities in Scotland to provide support and advice where required to ensure that school meals provision is meeting and in many cases exceeding the requirements of the regulation in Scotland.
The assessment of provision at the time of inspections are based on all food and drink provision in schools over the lunch period including vending machines as well as school run provisions. It is not possible to separate out from the figures which are from the school provision or other providers.
