# **1. Strategic Objective: Build a world-class curriculum for all learners in Scotland**

## **1.1 Support for the senior phase**

We are currently writing a learning resource for Advanced Higher Gàidhlig and Gaelic (Learners). National 5 Modern Studies Democracy is being translated. Please visit [Glow](#) for previously published support materials: National 3, 4, 5 and Higher Gàidhlig, Gaelic (Learners), and Gaelic Medium mathematics, Lifeskills mathematics, geography, history, modern studies. [E-stòras](#) also has useful resources for Gaelic Medium Education.

Schools and education authorities are invited to advise Education Scotland of the subjects that they are offering in the senior phase through the medium of Gaelic. Based on responses we will receive, we will translate learning materials that Education Scotland will be commissioning. Education Scotland acknowledges the co-operation of education authorities in sharing materials that they themselves have produced for the new qualifications and are made available on our website.

## **1.2 National Qualifications: Your feedback on National 4 and 5 materials**

Education Scotland, in association with ADES, has published web-based support materials for all courses from National 3 through to Higher. Practitioners of Gaelic Education are invited to give their views on resources by completing a [short e-survey](#). This will assist Education Scotland in identifying priority materials for update and enhancement.

## **1.3 Education Scotland showcases schools on the Journey to Excellence**

Education Scotland has published new case study films highlighting examples of good practice in creativity, health and wellbeing, and religious and moral education from establishments in Scotland. ## **2. Strategic Objective: Promote high-quality professional learning and leadership amongst education practitioners**

### **2.1 Gaelic Education Award at the Scottish Education Awards 2015**

Nominations are now invited for the Scottish Education Awards to recognise the achievements of schools and individuals who dedicate their lives to education and delivering opportunities for every child and young person to succeed in life. There are 17 award categories with new awards for sustainability, languages and partnerships. These include [Gaelic Education Award / Duais Foghlam Gàidhlig](#) which recognises establishments who are providing opportunities for children and young people to develop fluency in the Gaelic language. The [Making Languages Come Alive \(Primary\)](#) award recognises establishments who are working effectively to implement the 1+2 policy for language learning. ### **2.2 Leadership Award for Teachers of Gaelic Medium Education**

Social Enterprise Academy and Education Scotland are working in partnership to make available a leadership award for those in Gaelic Medium Education. The award will be delivered in two sessions, the first of which took place in December. Participants showed a real enthusiasm and commitment to this professional learning. ### **2.3 CLPL audit**

As part of the National Gaelic Education Strategy we are currently compiling an audit to help ascertain gaps in professional learning for Gaelic Education. We look forward to receiving your views to help shape our contributions to Glow and other events organised by partners.

### **2.4 Numeracy Time**

SSLN allows exploration of children and young people's performance across the numeracy organisers. This professional resource aims to share with practitioners, children's and young people's performance in time. It provides practitioners with more detail on children's and young people's strengths and areas for improvement in numeracy identified within the in-depth analysis of the SSLN numeracy survey data. For each area of level covered, survey-type questions are provided for illustrative purposes. This analysis provides all practitioners with an opportunity to reflect on, and explore planning for effective learning and teaching.

### 4. Strategic Objective: Influence national policy through evidence-based advice

#### 4.1 National Guidance on Gaelic Education

We have now completed a collation of our findings for the National Guidance on Gaelic Education. From this Education Scotland will publish an **Advice Note on Gaelic Education**. The document will provide advice for practitioners and local authorities on best practice in all aspects of Gaelic Education, and will also inform inspection. The Advice Note draws on findings from inspection of Gaelic Education, and Education Scotland's other engagements with practitioners of Gaelic Education, local authorities and key organisations. Education Scotland's work on Gaelic Education is also contributing to current discussions on national policy, and in particular the Gaelic Education provisions of the forthcoming Education Bill. Once the Bill is passed, Education Scotland's work will inform the development of statutory guidance to be issued under the new Education Act.

**6.1 Into Film** have partnered with the Stòrlann and consulted Education Scotland, as well as a number of Gaelic teachers, to look at Seachd: The Inaccessible Pinnacle (Property of Young Films Ltd © 2007. All rights reserved.) This new resource is aimed at Primary (second level: P4-7) and Secondary (third and fourth levels: S1-4) and is focused across different themes. In primary, these include storytelling, The Clearances and myths and legend. At secondary, themes include exploring the world of Seachd; identity through film; relationships and wellbeing. The resource includes teachers' notes, interactive PowerPoint presentations featuring clips from the film and supporting worksheets, in both Gaelic and English. The Secondary resource can also be used to prepare learners for using Seachd as a text in national assessment as they go into Senior phase.

### 6.8 A new book club for Gaelic Medium Education

A new book club, *Cuilean Cràicte*, is being established to support children and young people in Gaelic Medium Education (GME). It will be run by a group of volunteers which includes professional publishers, translators and parents of those in GME. The book club will make available each month a Gaelic chapter book. This will feature hot off the press translations of books by popular authors such as Terry Deary and Frank Cottrell Boyce. The benefits to children and young people include

- fostering an interest in reading
- encouraging independence in reading
- supporting skills in literacy and Gaelic
- helping to improve vocabulary
- helping to increase fluency in Gaelic.
