## Dear Parent/Carer

In May 2025, a team of inspectors from Education Scotland visited Georgetown Primary School and Nursery. During our visit, we talked to parents/carers and children and worked closely with the headteacher and staff.

The inspection team found the following strengths in the school's work.

- Highly articulate children across the school and nursery who are confident, happy and
  motivated by their learning. They demonstrate the school values in their positive
  interactions and relationships with others. Children are strongly committed to improving
  global issues and taking care of each other and their environment.
- The effective leadership of the headteacher and senior leaders. Together with the supportive and committed staff team, they have created a nurturing and caring environment across the school, nursery and Queensberry Learning Centre.
- The strong focus on improving the health and wellbeing of all children. As a result, children in the school and nursery have a very good understanding of their own strengths, needs and emotions. In Queensberry Learning Centre, this supports staff to meet children's wellbeing needs very well.
- The highly effective use of information and data by senior leaders and staff to raise children's attainment in literacy and numeracy. They identify children who require additional support with their learning and measure the impact of this effectively to ensure it leads to improved outcomes.

The following areas for improvement were identified and discussed with the headteacher and a representative from Dumfries and Galloway Council.

- Staff should continue to develop leadership roles for all children, including those in the nursery and at the younger stages in the school. Children are ready and able to play a greater role in evaluating the work of the school and identifying areas for improvement that are important to them as learners.
- Staff should continue to raise attainment for all. This will help all children to achieve as highly as possible.



We gathered evidence to enable us to evaluate the school's work using four quality indicators from How good is our school (4th edition) and How good is our early learning and childcare?. Quality indicators help schools, local authorities and inspectors to judge what is working well and what needs to be improved. Following the inspection of each school, the Scottish Government gathers details of our evaluations to keep track of how well Scottish schools are doing.
