Dear Parent/Carer

In December 2018, a team of inspectors from Education Scotland visited St Aidan's High School. During our visit, we talked to parents/carers and young people and worked closely with the headteacher and staff.

The inspection team found the following strengths in the school's work.

- The effective leadership of the headteacher, supported by her senior leadership team, which has ensured a strong commitment to improvement across the school. This is supporting strong leadership at all levels and a collaborative culture where staff 'seek the best for young people in Faith and learning'.
- The very well-planned work of the Learning and Teaching Working Group, through which teachers reflect together on their practice. This is leading to improvements in young people's learning experiences.
- The strong sense of community and the respectful, nurturing environment based on Gospel values. Young people have pride in their school.
- The wide range of very effective targeted support offered to young people and their families which is leading to improved attainment and broader personal achievements.
- The very high quality learning in music, inspiring large numbers of young people to demonstrate assured, expressive and imaginative performances of vocal and instrumental music.

The following areas for improvement were identified and discussed with the headteacher and a representative from North Lanarkshire Council.

- Continue to improve learning and teaching across the school to ensure that all young people experience high-quality learning which meets their needs consistently.
- Continue to explore and clarify the roles and responsibilities of staff in supporting the wellbeing of all young people. This should include regularly reviewing the wellbeing and personal support programme and improving approaches to identifying and measuring progress in all aspects of health and wellbeing.
- Continue to work together to develop confidence in teachers in the use of National Benchmarks. This will help to improve the rigour and reliability of professional judgements about young people's attainment from S1 to S3. This will also help to inform decisions about the appropriate levels of study for young people as they move through the school.



We gathered evidence to enable us to evaluate the school's work using four guality indicators from How good is our school? (4th edition). Quality indicators help schools, local authorities and inspectors to judge what is working well and what needs to be improved. Following the inspection of each school, the Scottish Government gathers details of our evaluations to keep track of how well Scottish schools are doing.
