Dear Parent/Carer

In November 2024, a team of inspectors from Education Scotland and the Care Inspectorate visited Farr Primary School and Farr High School Nursery- Bettyhill. During our visit, we talked to parents/carers and children and worked closely with the headteacher and staff.

The inspection team found the following strengths in the school's work.

- Across the school and nursery, children are confident, able and articulate. They are polite, well-mannered and welcoming to visitors.
- Senior leaders and staff across the school and nursery work very well together to create positive, respectful and trusting relationships with children, parents and the community. They are caring and supportive of children and each other.
- Practitioners in the nursery are highly effective. They support children to make very good progress in their learning through skilful interactions.
- Senior leaders in the nursery provide well considered sensitive and responsive support to practitioners to ensure that they can be highly effective in their role. As a result, children experience high quality early learning and childcare in a continually improving environment.

The following areas for improvement were identified and discussed with the headteacher and a representative from The Highland Council.

- Senior leaders need to work with staff across the school to ensure all improvement priorities are focused on improving children's progress and attainment across all areas of the curriculum.
- Senior leaders and staff across the school need to improve approaches to learning, teaching and assessment. They should ensure all children receive consistently high-quality learning experiences. Teachers need to use their assessment information more effectively to plan learning activities that match well children's needs and abilities.
- Senior leaders need to work with teachers to measure more effectively the progress children make over time. They need to monitor more closely the impact of planned approaches to raise attainment and close gaps in learning.

We gathered evidence to enable us to evaluate the school's work using four quality indicators from [How good is our school? \(4<sup>th</sup> edition\)](#) and [How good is our early learning and childcare?](#). Quality indicators help schools, local authorities and inspectors to judge what is working well and what needs to be improved. Following the inspection of each school, the Scottish Government gathers details of our evaluations to keep track of how well Scottish schools are doing.
