Dear Parent/Carer

In May 2019, a team of inspectors from Education Scotland and the Care Inspectorate visited Bellsbank Primary School and Early Childhood Centre. During our visit, we talked to parents/carers and children and worked closely with the headteacher and staff.

The inspection team found the following strengths in the school's work.

- The highly effective partnership working with parents. This is empowering them to become more engaged in their child's learning.
- The caring and nurturing ethos, which supports children to feel safe and secure.
- The targeted work to support children's literacy and communication skills in the Early Childhood Centre.

The following areas for improvement were identified and discussed with the headteacher and a representative from East Ayrshire Council.

- Senior leaders need to provide clear, strategic leadership and direction. Informed by improved approaches to self-evaluation, school improvement planning needs to lead to improved outcomes for all children.
- Strengthen the curriculum through the provision of clear progression frameworks, supported by a refreshed curriculum rationale.
- Senior leaders need to ensure that all learners experience high quality learning, teaching and assessment, with appropriate levels of pace and challenge for all children.
- Raise attainment in literacy and numeracy.





We gathered evidence to enable us to evaluate the school's work using four quality indicators from How good is our school? (4th edition) and How good is our early learning and childcare?. Quality indicators help schools, local authorities and inspectors to judge what is working well and what needs to be improved. Following the inspection of each school, the Scottish Government gathers details of our evaluations to keep track of how well Scottish schools are doing.

Requirements/recommendations made by Care Inspectorate for the nursery class

During the previous Care Inspectorate inspection, the setting had one requirement and four recommendations. From these, one requirement and two recommendations have been met. Outstanding issues relating to CI to provide details are carried forward in this inspection. As a result of this inspection, there are no requirements and two recommendations.

Recommendations

- Staff should enable and support children to plan and lead their own learning and provide meaningful experiences which motivate them and have fun playing and learning. Health and Social Care Standards – 2.27: As a child, I can direct my own play and act in the way that I choose, and freely access a wide range of experiences and resources suitable for my age and stage, which stimulate my natural curiosity, learning and creativity.
- Management should progress with monitoring the work of staff and the service as a whole. Health and Social Care Standards 4.23: I use a service and organisation that are well led
 - and managed.
