What does the word **stereotype** mean?



A **stereotype** is an idea about a particular group of people that is often untrue or unfair.



















Today we're going to be talking about how **stereotypes** affect people who have a visible difference (a mark, scar or condition that affects how they look).





Causes of a visible difference:

- Skin conditions like eczema, acne, or vitiligo
- Burns
- Birthmarks
- Craniofacial conditions, affecting the growth and development of the skull and face
- Cleft lip/palate (a gap or split in the upper lip and/or roof of the mouth)
- Cancer




There are many types of visible difference
