Dear Parent/Carer

In November 2018, a team of inspectors from Education Scotland visited St Maria Goretti Primary School. During our visit, we talked to parents/carers and children and worked closely with the headteacher and staff.

The inspection team found the following strengths in the school's work.

- Polite, well-behaved children who are proud of their school. Staff who are committed to developing positive relationships, which is resulting in a calm, positive ethos.
- Across the school staff have improved confidence in the learning and teaching of numeracy. This has been effectively supported by the Challenge Leader of Learning.
- The good progress in English for children with an additional language. They are very well supported by specialist staff.

The following areas for improvement were identified and discussed with the headteacher and a representative from Glasgow City Council.

- To increase the pace of change to raise attainment, the leadership team needs to provide stronger leadership and direction to the work of the school.
- To ensure children receive high quality of teaching and learning in all classes across
 the school staff should develop a shared understanding of assessment and ensure that
 this informs planned learning.
- Staff should work together to develop more robust approaches to monitoring and tracking attainment and achievement.



We gathered evidence to enable us to evaluate the school's work using quality indicators from How good is our school? (4th edition). Quality indicators help schools, local authorities and inspectors to judge what is working well and what needs to be improved. Following the inspection of each school, the Scottish Government gathers details of our evaluations to keep track of how well Scottish schools are doing.
