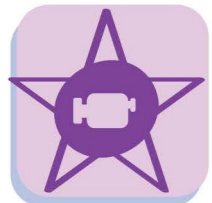
NEW DEER PRIMARY SCHOOL

I like to think of our progress in using technology as a series of 'LIGHTBULB MOMENTS'.

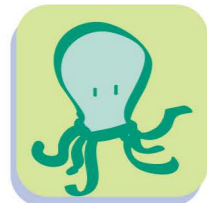

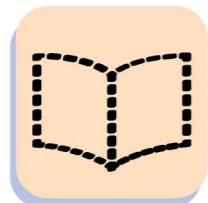

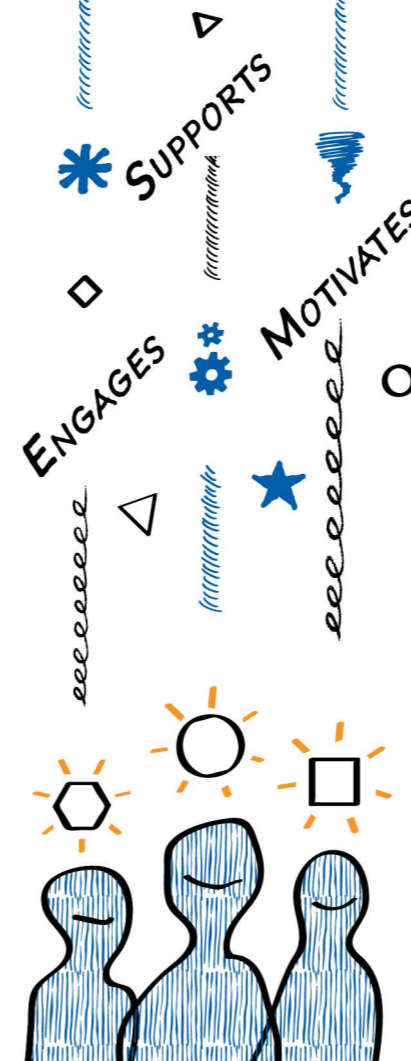
