## Dear Parent/Carer

In January 2023, a team of inspectors from Education Scotland visited St Bridget's Primary School and Nursery Class. During our visit, we talked to parents/carers and children and worked closely with the headteacher and staff.

The inspection team found the following strengths in the school's work.

- The clear, well-directed and strong leadership of the new headteacher. She has quickly
  established positive relationships with children, parents and staff and has an aspirational
  vision for the future of St Bridget's.
- Children across the school and nursery who are polite, friendly and keen to learn. They
  welcome opportunities to engage in the life of their school and look forward to having
  greater involvement.
- Staff across the school and nursery who know children and families very well. They are caring and supportive of children and each other. They are committed to improving their practice in order to improve outcomes for children.

The following areas for improvement were identified and discussed with the headteacher and a representative from Glasgow City Council.

- Improve the leadership of promoted staff across the school and the nursery.
- Improve the standards of learning, teaching and assessment across the school and nursery. Ensure all children are motivated by high quality learning experiences across the curriculum.
- Develop effective systems to monitor children's progress and provide additional support across the school and nursery to better meet all children's wellbeing and learning needs.
- Raise attainment in literacy and numeracy across the school. In doing so, teachers and practitioners across the school and nursery need to develop a better understanding of national standards.



We gathered evidence to enable us to evaluate the school's work using four quality indicators from How good is our school? (4th edition) and How good is our early learning and childcare?. Quality indicators help schools, local authorities and inspectors to judge what is working well and what needs to be improved. Following the inspection of each school, the Scottish Government gathers details of our evaluations to keep track of how well Scottish schools are doing.
