- ★ TEACHERS report increased confidence, enthusiasm and digital skills to support REMOTE AND DIRECT TEACHING and LEARNING
- ★ PUPILS are aware of the importance of DIGITAL SKILLS in life and work and report high levels of enjoyment and confidence in this area


FOCUS on PHYSICAL and MENTAL WELLBEING through OUTDOOR LEARNING and parent workshops
