



Quality indicators help schools, education authorities and inspectors to judge what is good and what needs to be improved in the work of the school. You can find these quality indicators in the publication *How good is our school?*¹. Quality indicators for the nursery class can be found in the publication *Child at the Centre*². Following the inspection of each school, the Scottish Government gathers evaluations of three important quality indicators to keep track of how well all Scottish schools are doing.

The Care Inspectorate publishes quality grades to inform people and the Scottish Government about the quality of care services. Awarding grades at inspections is aimed at encouraging providers to identify and address areas for improvement. The Care Inspectorate also uses the grades to ensure its inspection activity is targeted and proportionate. The grades at inspection are awarded against four quality themes, details of which can be found on the Care Inspectorate website.

Nursery class

At the last inspection that was conducted by the Care Inspectorate, there were 4 recommendations. From these all recommendations have been met. As a result of this inspection, there is 1 requirement and 4 recommendations.

Requirements

• The provider must not employ any person unless that person is fit to be so employed. In order to comply with this the provider should ensure that staff employed to work with any child in the nursery are registered with the appropriate registering body, including the Scottish Social Services Council. This is in order to comply with The Social Care and Social Work Improvement Scotland (Requirements for Care Services) Regulations 2011 No 210 9(2)(c) Timescale for completion: Immediately.

Recommendations

- Parents and children using the service should have the opportunity to have a say about the what the service does and to make improvements to the service.
 Management and staff of the nursery should continue to develop the variety of methods used for involving parents and children in assessing and improving quality. National Care Standards for Early Education and Childcare up to the age of 16, Standard 13 Improving the service and Standard 5 Quality of experience.
- Children should be supported by staff who respond to their individual needs in a
 way which is sensitive to their individual circumstances. Staff should continue to
 develop care plans so that they are working documents which clearly show how
 children's needs will be met. They should incorporate the wellbeing indicators to
 ensure that plans are individual for each child and there should be a chronology
 which clearly shows actions taken and reviews. This should include, where
 appropriate, risk assessments which ensure that children are protected. National
 Care Standards for Early Education and Childcare up to the age of 16, Standards
 4 Engaging with children, 5 Quality of experience and 6 Support and
 Development.
- Children should be kept safe and cared for by staff who have gone through a safe recruitment procedure. This should include informing them of their responsibilities for registering with the appropriate professional body at the time of their appointment. National Care Standards for Early Education and Childcare up to the age of 16, Standard 12 – Confidence in staff and National Care Standards early education and childcare up to the age of 16, Standard 14: A well managed service.
- Management should continue to develop monitoring systems for all aspects of the service which are systematic and rigorous and which inform improvement. They should clearly set out the roles and responsibilities of all involved in the process of assuring quality for the whole service. They should ensure that all staff involved have a better understanding of how to evaluate the work of the service. National Care Standards for Early Education and Childcare up to the age of 16, Standard 14 – Well-managed service.

A notification from the Care Inspectorate will be sent to the Provider to complete an action plan to address the Requirements and Recommendations made as a result of this inspection.






